With access to cutting edge equipment, including virtual reality and digital dissection, students will graduate ready for the biomedical workforce, or for postgraduate physiotherapy, occupational therapy and medicine. An ATAR of 60.00 will guarantee an offer.

Bachelor of Nutrition

Lab-based study meets progressive food trend analysis in the <u>Bachelor of Nutrition</u>. In this always-evolving field, students will examine the science of nutrition and uncover new ideas in the relationship between food and human health, with pathways into industry or postgraduate dietetics. An ATAR of 60.00 will guarantee an offer.



Global Educators Diploma of Nursing Pathway

After successful completion of the *Diploma of Nursing* — which is currently a FREE TAFE course — students may have the option of applying to universities and being granted up to 12 months credit towards most 3-year Bachelor of Nursing qualifications. Box Hill Institute has specific articulation arrangements with *ACU*, *Deakin and La Trobe* Universities.

RMIT Diploma of Radiation Science

Our new <u>Diploma of Radiation Science</u> is now live and students can now add it to their preferences on VTAC.

In 2025, the Diploma of Radiation Science is only available as part of a packaged Guaranteed Pathway into the Bachelor of Medical Radiation. Students can choose to focus their studies in one of three streams in the Bachelor degree via these pathways:

- DP022PATH1 Diploma of Radiation Science > Bachelor of Medical Radiation (Medical Imaging)
- DP022PATH2 Diploma of Radiation Science > Bachelor of Medical Radiation (Nuclear Medicine)
- DP022PATH3 Diploma of Radiation Science > Bachelor of Medical Radiation (Radiation Therapy)

While the Diploma is not currently available for applications outside these Guaranteed Pathway packages, students who decide not to pursue the Bachelor degree at the end of their studies also have the option to pursue alternate studies. See Pathways for more details.

How to be ready for university

So, you're thinking about heading off to university next year? Exciting times ahead! But we know it can feel a bit overwhelming too. Don't worry – we've got your back. Here's a step-by-step guide to help you prepare and be ready for university.

Research your options

First things first: figure out what and where you want to study. It's a big decision, so take your time and explore your options.

- Look into different courses and universities. What subjects interest you? Which unis offer the best programs in those areas?
- Attend university <u>open days</u> (virtual or in-person) to get a feel for campus life and ask questions.
- Talk to current uni students or recent graduates about their experiences.

- Practice time management. Try using a planner or digital calendar to organise your tasks and deadlines.
- Learn to study independently. University often involves more self-directed learning than high school.
- Work on your note-taking skills. Try different methods to find what works best for you.

Build your life skills

University isn't just about academics – it's also about learning to be independent. You'll have a lot more freedom as an adult, but a lot more responsibilities too. Here's what we recommend:

How to get there: A degree in <u>Fashion Merchandising</u>, <u>Business</u>, or a related field like <u>Marketing</u> is usually the backbone of this job. Experience in retail or as a buying assistant could also kickstart your career as a buyer.

4. Fashion Public Relations Manager

These specialist PR managers are in charge of managing the public image of brands and designers. They handle media relations, organise events, and craft press releases to promote their clients. This job requires excellent communication skills and a knack for building relationships, so if you're a people person it might be the perfect role for you.

How to get there: A degree in <u>Public Relations</u>, <u>Communications</u>, or <u>Fashion</u> is helpful. Gaining experience through <u>internships</u> or working with PR agencies can also be a really strong foundation to set you up for success.

5. Fashion Photographer

These photographers capture high-quality images of clothing, accessories, and models for magazines, ads, and online content. This role combines a passion for fashion with the art of photography, making it ideal for those who enjoy visual storytelling.

How to get there: Build a portfolio of your work and think about taking <u>photography courses</u> to improve your skills. If you really wanted to get ahead, you could even do a degree like this <u>Bachelor of Arts in Fashion Photography</u>. Networking and gaining experience through freelance projects or <u>internships</u> will also help you get ahead in this competitive industry.

6. Fashion Illustrator

Fashion illustrators create artistic renderings of clothing and accessories. Their work is used in design presentations, marketing materials, and editorial content. If you have strong drawing skills and a love for fashion, this role allows you to bring designs to life on paper and combine your two passions.

How to get there: Pursue a degree in <u>Fashion Illustration</u>, <u>Fine Arts</u>, or a related field like <u>Fashion Design</u>. You can also develop a portfolio of your illustrations and network with industry professionals to find opportunities.

7. Fashion Event Coordinator

Event coordinators in this field plan and execute fashion shows, product launches, and promotional events. They handle logistics, coordinate with vendors, and ensure everything runs smoothly.
